Countering Violent Extremism Manager Program Grant Proposal Promising Practices-Single Project Track \$150,000 funds requested

Project Abstract

The ND Department of Emergency Services is looking to develop a Countering Violent Extremism program, within the ND State and Local Intelligence Center. This program would be aimed at working towards establishing a prevention framework for counter violent extremism across North Dakota. The ND Department of Emergency Services would take the first steps in establishing this framework by leveraging their existing contacts in both the law enforcement and public sector and training these key partners in understanding the threat of targeted violence and domestic violence extremism though the use of the DHS's current training curriculum, the Law Enforcement Awareness briefing. The NDSLIC would use these grant funds, to hire and individual to conduct this training across the state and for the costs associated with funding this training for our partners.

Project Narrative

The ND Department of Emergency Services is requesting funding to plan and develop a Countering Violent Extremism program within the ND State and Local Intelligence Center ND (SLIC). This program would be aimed at working towards establishing a prevention framework by increasing societal awareness of the radicalization to violent process and what the threat of targeted violence looks like. If awarded this funding, ND DES plans to leverage the relationship the ND SLIC has with the law enforcement community and other community leaders to implement officer training and community awareness. The ND SLIC would use the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) current existing training curriculum for the public and law enforcement (Law Enforcement Awareness Briefing). The ND SLIC would customize this for local needs, based not only on the state of ND but for the community in which the training is being presented.

1. Needs Assessment

Currently the State of North Dakota does not have a Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention Program (TVTP). This is a gap in awareness of the radicalization to violence process and the threat of targeted violence for North Dakota law enforcement and community leaders. The State of North Dakota has experienced several incidents over the past several years where a TVTP is needed.

- In 2012 in Leith, ND Craig Cobb started to purchase homes and land to build a racially conscious white community. Prior to coming to North Dakota Cobb had been banned from Estonia for a decade for hate speech due to the content of his website. As well as having hate crime charges against him; "willful promoting of hatred" in Canada.
- In 2015 after the Paris terror attacks; Minot, ND city of less than 50,000, dealing with terrorist threats became a reality as the names of six people stationed at the Minot Air Force Base appeared on an Islamic State hit list.²
- December 8, 2015, the Juba Coffee House which was owned by individuals of Somali decent had been ignited intentionally and graffiti was painted on the exterior wall of the building. The graffiti included what appears to be an "SS" in the style of a symbol from Nazi Germany above the painted words "go home."
- June 19, 2019, the North Dakota State Advisory Committee to the United States Commission on Civil Rights held a briefing to learn about the impact of hate crimes

statewide. North Dakota has been notorious for high occurrences of hate crimes, ranking second with the most per capita in 2012, 2014, and 2015.⁴

April 25, 2021 a Fargo, ND area mosque was vandalized. Officers found anti-Muslim, anti-Semitic, and racist messages spray-painted on several areas outside the buildings during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan. Police in Minnesota arrested a 22-year-old man in the vandalism of a mosque after a tip from a Walmart employee who examined spray paint purchase records and store surveillance video in search of a possible suspect.⁵

The implementation of a TVTP in North Dakota would be a proactive approach in assisting with bridging the current gap along with establishing a collaborative environment striving towards effective targeted violence and terrorism prevention strategies.

2. Program Design

Problem Statement:

The state of North Dakota has a population of 762,062 which is an increase of more than 13% from April 2010. The population of ND consists of rural areas that rely on agriculture and ranching to larger, more urban areas that are spread out throughout the state. North Dakota is a northern border state which shares 310 miles with Canada and only has 18 international ports for coverage. This limited coverage may provide opportunities for adversarial actors to cross the porous border undetected and gain access to the United States. This diverse landscape provides some unique challenges for many of the services that center around public safety in the state. In 2014, the then Governor Jack Dalrymple, set-up the North Dakota State and Local Intelligence Center by executive order, in efforts to centralize North Dakota's fusion process and to serve as the primary interface between North Dakota and the Federal Government for information gathering, analysis and dissemination.

The mission of the ND SLIC is to gather, evaluate, analyze and disseminate information and intelligence data on crimes, both real and suspected, to the law enforcement community, government officials and private industry concerning dangerous drugs, fraud, organized crime, terrorism, cyber and other criminal activity for the purposes of decision making, public safety and proactive law enforcement while ensuring the rights and privacy of citizens. The NDSLIC is uniquely situated to empower front-line law enforcement, public safety, fire service, emergency response, public health, critical infrastructure protection, and private sector security personnel to understand local implications of national intelligence, thus enabling local officials to better protect their communities. The ND SLIC is the central point for inter/intra agency information sharing. It is responsible for the review, analysis, and dissemination of pertinent homeland security and law enforcement intelligence. As the state fusion center, the NDSLIC is the liaison between federal, state, local and tribal agencies helping to combat major criminal threats and improve counter-terrorism strategies. The ND SLIC provides essential intelligence to private and public industry representatives to ensure safety and security across all sectors. The ND SLIC is responsible for providing the North Dakota Homeland Security Advisor and the

Governor's Office with timely information as it relates to acts of terrorism or terrorist threats that directly impact North Dakota.

We know that terrorism and targeted violence pose a grave threat to the Homeland that are continuing to evolve and remain a priority for public safety agencies across the United States, including in ND. A challenge faced in North Dakota, is the vast differences and services offered in communities across the state. There are many small local law enforcement agencies across the state that employee less than 5 sworn officers to mid-size agencies that employee over 100 sworn officers. While ND is small in population, relative to other states, ND has still seen indices of domestic violence extremism across the state and in communities in other states that share borders with ND. The lack of funding and rural nature of our state, can impact the ability for law enforcement to receive up to date training in regard to subjects that include targeted violence and terrorism prevention, as well as have services readily available when needed.

The ND SLIC is an a unique situation in ND, that it is not only responsible for the collection and dissemination of intelligence as it relates to terrorism and targeted violence; the ND SLIC also has established relationships in both the law enforcement community and with community leaders that can be leveraged to reach all segments of ND and expand targeted violence and terrorism knowledge across the state. The ND SLIC is aware of local dynamics facing many of the communities across the state and has worked to build relationships and trust in order to foster information sharing and reduce risk to the citizens of North Dakota. The ND SLIC is hoping to utilize DHS's existing training programs, the Law Enforcement Awareness Briefing and the Community Awareness Briefing, in order to address the first objective of the TVTP grant program, which is to help drive awareness of targeted violence and terrorism across North Dakota in hope to increase societal awareness and increase the skills needed to identify and avoid narratives related to recruitment and mobilization to violence.

Program goals and objectives:

The goal of this project is to enhance understating of violent extremist threat and increase societal awareness of the radicalization to violence process and what the threat of targeted violence and terrorism look like. The ND DES is aware of the challenges of implementing a prevention framework across an entire state and believes having this program ran through the ND SLIC will help the program succeed. There are many reasons why this is challenging but one of the main hurdles is trying to find a one-size fits all approach for communities, that are not all the same or have the same services available. Knowing this challenge, we have chosen objectives that work in a variety of communities but still hope to achieve the goal of this project and supports the Department of Homeland Security's Strategic Framework for Countering Terrorism and Targeted Violence. The objectives for this goal include in-depth, localized training for community member and law enforcement stakeholders. The ND SLIC would utilize and customize the Law Enforcement Awareness Briefing on Terrorism Prevention (LAB) and the Community Awareness Briefing program martials in order to close the gap in North Dakota. The NDSLIC would work to train at least 100 law enforcement members and 100 community leaders through the life of this grant. The NDSLIC would strive to increase the understanding and awareness of risk factors and behaviors to violent extremism among those trained by 50% by the end of the program's period.

Logic model:

- A theory of change: The NDSLIC believes that if they leverage their existing
 relationships with law enforcement and community leaders across ND, they will be able
 to increase societal awareness of the radicalization to violence and what they threat of
 targeted violence and terrorism look like.
- Short- and Long-term outcomes:
 - Short-term Outcomes: Increase of knowledge of the indicators of targeted violence and terrorism across the state.
 - Long-term Outcomes: Increase reporting and the development of local frameworks in communities across the state.

Outputs:

- Train at least 100 law enforcement officers and increase understanding and awareness by 50%
- Train at least 100 community leaders and increase understanding by 50%
- Administer pre and post surveys to participants to ensure increase in knowledge and understanding.

• Activities:

- Hold training session for law enforcement, minimum of two per quarter.
- Hold training session for community members, minimum of two per quarter.
- Use pre and post surveys to measure understanding and knowledge increase.

Inputs:

- Personnel funding for salary and benefits to hire staff
- Travel costs
- Time for program development and presentation
- Contextual factors and underlying assumptions:
 - Community need/want for information
 - o Law enforcement willing to let their staff train
 - The ability to hire a qualified candidate

These factors and underlying assumptions are being accounted for by having the support from law enforcement staff prior to apply for the grant, and continuing to work with our partners and establish trust before, during, and after the grant period.

 Likelihood of Success: The likelihood of successfully meeting out objectives is good based on our existing relationship with law enforcement and community members. The success may be limited based on the ability to hire an individual to implement this program.

Theory of Change:

The NDSLIC believes that if they leverage their existing relationships with law enforcement and community leaders across ND, they will be able to increase societal awareness of the radicalization to violence process and what the threat of targeted violence and terrorism look like.

3. Organization and key personnel

The ND SLIC is set up to help the efforts of the United States government to establish a national network of Fusion Centers, which will serve as the "central hub" of North Dakota's fusion process and serve as the primary interface between North Dakota and the Federal Government for information gathering, analysis and dissemination. The ND SLIC Executive Board is comprised of the Adjutant General of the North Dakota National Guard, the Director of the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation, the Colonel of the North Dakota Highway Patrol, Director of the North Dakota Division of Homeland Security, and the North Dakota Information Technology Department Chief Information Officer. The ND SLIC Executive Board has the primary responsibility for the overall operation of the ND SLIC including, but not limited to, its information systems, personnel, and operations.

ND DES is proposing this project to fund a full-time temporary employee designated at the Countering Violent Terrorism Program Manager, that would be hired by ND DES and assigned to the ND SLIC. This individual would be hired during the first quarter of the grant period. The program coordinator will serve to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community. This individual would be tasked with the mission of fulfilling the project goal by conducting training for the law enforcement community and community leaders throughout ND and emphasizing the vital need to thoroughly share information with those who have a need and/or right to know, while protecting the privacy and civil right and civil liberties of the citizens of ND. The program manager, once hired, would undergo training focusing on P/CRCL as well as

domestic violent extremism. In order to leverage the pre-existing relationship, the ND SLIC has with our target audiences, the program manager would work with our existing ILO's to coordinate the training across out state. The program manager would lean upon the existing LAB and CAB programs but add context specific to the state of ND and the target audience's community.

4. Sustainability

We believe this project will be sustainable, even after the grant period expires and this is one of the reasons of having this project implanted though the ND SLIC. Once the project period expires, ND SLIC staff will be able to continue to conduct the law enforcement trainings as well as the community leaders training. The bulk of the work would have already been completed by the Countering Violent Extremism Manager, so the ND SLIC plans on utilizing their existing ILO personnel to conduct these trainings after the end of the grant period.

5. Budget detail and narrative

ND DES is asking for funding in the amount of \$150,000. This funding will be used to pay for the salary and benefits of a full-time employee for the funding period, equipment (such as a laptop), training supplies, travel costs for training, and management and administrative costs. This employee with be trained in the area of countering violent extremism, specifically DHS's LAB and CAB programs. The employee with then work with the ND SLIC existing ILO's to conduct training to local law enforcement and community leaders that is customized for each community across the state of ND.
