With nearly 40 years of experience in the criminal and juvenile justice field, I strongly believe that full civic participation by citizens living in our community protects public safety. There is credible evidence that former offenders who have the right to vote are less likely to re-offend. The adoption of Rule 9, extending automatic restoration of civil rights for certain offenders, sent a message that people who have served their sentences of incarceration are welcome as integral members of their home communities. Bringing people into the political process invests them in our democracy and encourages them to lead law-abiding lives, thereby decreasing
