- The deployment of the equipment, of course,

- and election day given that that's when early voting and
- precinct voting happens.
- The preparation of the tabulation system,
- poll-worker training, many items that don't require as
- many of our full-time employees but that's where we wrap
- up with temporary employees. Then, of course, our
- permanent staff and additional temporaries that are
- hired are busy with the critical component of
- maintaining all the records, management of the
- operation. We continue to receive applications during
- that 29-day period that allow people to be registered
- for the next election.

- A. Well, the term we use is we would enter that
