Database Implementation Status

New Jersey is currently constructing a top-down voter registration system, in which each county will directly access one centralized state database. As of March 2005, New Jersey retained Covansys Corporation, in partnership with PCC Technology Group and Aradyme Corporation, to assist in creating the statewide system.²

Entering Voter Registration Information

Who inputs voter registration information? County commissioners of registration generally review and enter information from voter registration forms in their jurisdictions into the statewide system.³

What happens to voter registration forms submitted at state registration agencies? Forms received by the Attorney General, the DMV, or another voter registration agency are transferred to the appropriate county commissioner for review and entry.⁴

How are most forms submitted? Statistics reported for New Jersey in 2004 do not readily explain where voter registration forms were submitted.⁵

Processing of Forms Without Identifying Numbers

How will the state treat an application with an affirmative indication that the applicant has no valid identifying number? New Jersey's form does not clearly state how an applicant should indicate that she has no valid identifying number.

How will the state treat an application without an identifying number and without an affirmative indication that the applicant has no such number? The applicant will be considered registered, but if the number is uncorrected (see below), and if she is a first-time voter registering by mail, she will have to show identification at the polls.

How will the state treat an application listing an identifying number that is either incomplete or illegible? The applicant will be considered registered, but if the number is uncorrected (see below), and if she is a first-time voter registering by mail, she will have to show identification at the polls.

Making the List NJ - 1

Matching Against Motor Vehicle and Social Security Records

What fields from the voter registration form will the state seek to match to motor vehicle or Social Security records? Identifying number, name, date of birth, and address.

How precise is the match standard? New Jersey will use a hybrid match standard to match information on forms with a driver's license number: the number must match exactly, but discretion is then left to the county official to determine whether any of the returned records match. New Jersey will use the standard AAMVA criteria for matching information on forms with SSN digits: exact match of the SSN-4, first name, last name, month of birth, and year of birth.

How much human intervention is involved in determining whether information is matched? For matching information on forms with driver's license numbers, the system will return a list of records with an exact match of the driver's license on the voter registration application; the county official has the discretion to determine whether a likely match exists among the possible matches returned. The process for matching information on forms with SSNs is fully automated.

Description of matching process: New Jersey's new system will automate the match process so that it takes only a few seconds. For matching information on forms with driver's license numbers, the DMV will return a list of all records that match the driver's license number exactly, for the county official to review. Information on forms listing SSN digits will be automatically checked against the SSA database through the standard AAMVA process: the county commissioner will submit an entered record to the DMV database, which will automatically submit the appropriate fields to the SSA and return a code indicating whether the record was successfully matched or not.

What are the consequences if the state cannot find a match? The applicant will be registered, but if the failed match is uncorrected (see below), and if she is a first-time voter registering by mail, she must show identification before Election Day or at the polls.

Notice and Opportunity to Resolve Errors

Does the applicant have the opportunity to correct a missing or incomplete identifying number, without submitting a new form? Yes. The applicant may correct missing or incomplete information at any point before the poll books are printed, which usually occurs 2-3 weeks before an election.

Does the applicant have the opportunity to resolve a failed match, without submitting a new form? Yes. The applicant may submit information to resolve a failed match at any point before the poll books are printed, which usually occurs 2-3 weeks before an election.

If information on an otherwise timely application is corrected after the voter registration deadline, is the correction timely? Yes. The applicant may correct information at any point before the poll books are printed, which is usually 2-3 weeks before an election.

Description of notice and correction process: The county elections official will attempt to notify a first-time applicant registering by mail whose identifying number is missing, incomplete, illegible, or unverified; many officials will attempt to contact the applicant first by phone, and then by mail. The applicant may attempt to resolve the error at any point before the poll books are printed, which is usually 2-3 weeks before an election. If the identifying number cannot be verified, the applicant will be registered, but she will have to provide identification at the polls.

Identification Requirements at the Polls

Who must provide identification at the polls? A first-time voter who registered by mail, whose identifying number has not been verified, and who has not previously presented a copy of valid identification to a county elections official, must provide identification at the polls.⁶

Forms of ID:

1st-time voters registering by mail without verified identifying number: current and valid photo ID current utility bill w/ name, address bank statement w/ name, address government check w/ name, address paycheck w/ name, address other gov't document w/ name, address

What forms of identification are accepted? A current and valid photo ID, or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document showing the voter's name and address.

What are the consequences of failing to show identification? The voter may cast a provisional ballot, which be counted only if the individual provides identification by the second day after the election.⁷

Statutes and Regulations

N.J. STAT. ANN. §§ 19:31-1 *et seq.* generally concern registration. N.J. STAT. ANN. § 19:31-31, *as amended by* 2005 N.J. Sess. Law Serv. ch. 145 (S. 28), directs the Attorney General to establish and maintain a single statewide voter registration system. N.J. ADMIN. CODE §§ 13:17-1.1 *et seq.* comprise the applicable regulations.

● You must complete Section 9 ONLY if you are registering by mail for the first time in your county and have never voted in a federal election in the county. The ID # that you give must be verified. You will be contacted by the county commissioner of registration if those numbers cannot be verified. If you do not provide either a driver's license number or the last four numbers of your social security number, you must include a copy of a current and valid ID document such as: A valid photo ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, pay check, or any other government document that shows your name and address.

If you are a first-time registrant by mail and you do not provide any ID, or if your ID numbers cannot be verified, before voting for the first time, you must provide ID at the polling place or submit ID if voting by absentee ballot. If you do not provide ID at the polling place, you must vote by provisional ballot. You will have until the close of business on the second day after the election to provide ID to the county commissioner of registration. Your provisional ballot will be rejected if you do not provide ID. ID numbers are confidential and will not be released by any governmental agency. Any person who uses identification illegally shall be subject to criminal penalties.
